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Common Questions about the IGETC

1. **What is the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum?**
 The Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) is a general education program which community college transfer students can use to fulfill lower-division general education requirements for either the UC or CSU system.

2. **Is completion of the IGETC an admissions requirement?**
 No. However, UC Berkeley's College of Letter & Science requires **full completion of the IGETC pattern** as selection criteria for admission into the College.

3. **Is it advisable for all transfer students to follow the IGETC?**
 No. Some students may be better served by taking courses which fulfill the CSU General Education - Breadth requirements, or the general education pattern of the specific UC campus to which they plan to transfer. Students pursuing majors that require extensive lower-division major preparation such as Engineering or Business (UC Berkeley) may not
